I've just returned from the New Zealand Principals Federation conference which is always a time for reflection.

We started with a presentation from our current president, Leanne Otene, around the purpose of schooling and formal education who reminded us that education is not about filling a bucket, it's about lighting a fire.

She referred to the work of Professor Gert Biesta who talks of 3 pillars or purposes of education, that are all equally important and need to be in balance.

1. We want children to develop knowledge and skills for success, to gain qualification and be able to go on and gain vocational or professional roles.

- 2. Children also need to learn how to understand and adhere to the community rules, values, customs/traditions and to contribute to these as they evolve. Socisalisation is a valuable part of education.
- 3. Finally education needs to be around personal growth and development, the development of a unique, autonomous person able to think critically and form their own opinions with a strong sense of self.

Obviously the first one is the easiest to measure and monitor the development of and therefore tends to be what we focus on, however Leanne urged us to dig deeper and consider how we might monitor the development of things like critical thinking, creativity and empathy. This fits very well with our Language of Learning that is at the heart of our teaching and learning at Reremogna.

We live in a world facing complex challenges like climate change, the impact of social media, and artificial intelligence. Those who lack critical thinking skills are vulnerable to being exploited. We need creative thinking to problem solve the increasingly complex issues society faces. In a world of AI and evolving technology, we need to focus on what makes us uniquely human.

Following on from Leanne, we also heard from the futurist Gihan Perera around how we need to lead in these times and the impact of AI in schooling. He referred to John Tan from the Obama Institute, who says that instead of asking children what they want to be when they grow up, ask them "what problem do you want to solve?"

He also referenced Albert Einstein's famous quote about imagination: "Imagination is more important than knowledge. For knowledge is limited, whereas imagination embraces the entire world, and all there ever will be to know and understand". While knowledge has its boundaries based on what is known, imagination is boundless, enabling the discovery of new ideas and progress. Again Gihan's talk showed the value of our Reremoana School Language of Learning and how it's important for the focus of our tamariki.

Gihan explored the shifting of global power and emerging economies and New Zealand's and Australia's places in the world. Did you know that now more people live inside the green circle in the image above, than outside it? The previous powerhouses of Europe and America are now outweighed by the people power of Asia, where New Zealand and Australia sit just outside but have close links.

While change is inevitable and can feel scary, there is a lot to be optimistic about and I believe that at Reremoana School we are educating our tamariki for the future. *Julie Cowan*














ORDER VIA HERO \$25
