Welcome to Term 4, always an exciting and busy term. Summer is getting closer and I'm loving the longer daylight hours!

Some of the highlights of our Term 4 2025 calendar are a junior production, senior and junior athletics, Counties Manukau Games, Diwali, hosting the Scholastic Book Fair and our traditional end of year events in Year 8 Graduation and Junior and Senior Celebrations of Learning. All of the teams have some exciting events and learning planned. In term 4 as well as bringing together the year's learning staff are also busy planning for 2026. Term 4 is a time for celebrating and planning as well as striving to achieve goals with the end of the year in sight.

At the end of last term the board election results were announced and our outgoing board members met with the new board members (and those reelected) for a hand over meeting. I want to once again thank our outgoing board members – Adam Manukau, Renee Maxwell, Janine Baker and Sarah Hutchinson. Another congratulations and welcome (or welcome back) to our current board Ken Zhang, Emma Saxon, Alisha Hunter, Olivia Marks, Govind Shaw and Martin Bienvenu. Emma Saxon has stepped up to be our new presiding member. Congratulations and thank you Emma! I really look forward to working with everyone on the board for the next 3 years, working together to support the staff and students of Reremoana School.

You are likely aware that support staff (eg school office staff, learning assistants), teachers (both primary and secondary) and primary principals are currently in negotiation for their contracts/collective agreements. Support staff have been in negotiations for almost 1 year with no resolution having strongly rejected the offers so far presented. Teachers have been in negotiation since May. Teachers have been given 2 offers and both have been rejected. While the 2nd offer was an improvement in terms of pay, there were several clawbacks (so benefits that were in previous contracts that were proposed to be removed) that are of concern to teachers as well as not addressing the conditions that teachers work in. Teachers are concerned about the lack of support for learners and the impact of teacher workload and stress has on the tamariki they teach. The work conditions of teachers, principals and support staff are the learning conditions of our tamariki.

While principals have been negotiations since July we still haven't been presented with any offer at all.

We need working in schools, as a support staff member, as a teacher or as a principal to be attractive and sustainable in order to provide the very best education for our tamariki. Our profession continues to lose so many excellent teachers and principals every year because they are burnt out or disillusioned. This impacts on the whole of our society.

Full information regarding Athletics Day has been shared in a separate HERO post, and can also be found **here**.

The main things to know are:

- Senior Athletics Day is on Tuesday Oct 28 the day after Labour day
- It is for all children who will turn 8 this year. This means we may have a few Te Puna Y2 students attending
- Students are asked to be at school early 8 a.m.
- Athletes compete in "Year Born In" groups e.g born in 2016 9 year old, even if birthday is after the 28th October
- The event is at Jellicoe Park, Manurewa this year as our usual venue is out for maintenance
- All students are to wear house colours, or school PE uniform
- Hats and sunscreen are a must, as is a full water bottle and substantial lunch
- Lunch packs are available, and can be ordered via KINDO in the coming days
- Spectators are not allowed on the track or inside the arena
- Transport is to be via bus for all students \$15 per student
- 20 helpers are required to make the day happen

Measles in Aotearoa

Then Ministry of Education has asked schools to share the follwing information with their school communities:

Measles cases in Aotearoa

Recent measles cases linked to overseas travel have been reported in Te Tai Tokerau and Queenstown. Cases were active in the community while infectious and there is a risk of measles circulating there, and more widely in Aotearoa.

- Measles is very contagious and can make people of any age very sick.
- Watch for measles symptoms fever, cough, runny nose, sore eyes and a blotchy rash.

- If anyone in your whānau has measles symptoms keep them home and contact a doctor or Healthline urgently on 0800 611 116.
- Vaccination is the best protection from measles. Check all whānau are immunised.















This year, we will again produce the Reremoana Yearbook, the yearly school magazine.

Yearbooks will be given out in the last week of school.




A New Name for JCHS

Well Done, Yiyan


Yiyan participated the in Level 7

Board of Trustees News

School Closed for Planned Strike Thursday 23 October

NZEI have announced a plan to strike over contract negotiations for support staff, teachers and principals on Thursday 23 October.

The vast majority of our staff at Reremoana School are members of NZEI and will be participating in the planned strike action. The board have considered the options available to them with a focus on the health and safety of students and staff, and have decided that if the strike goes ahead Reremoana School will be closed on Thursday 23 October.

We thank our community for their support and understanding.
