To those celebrating Diwali, Happy Diwali to you and your loved ones. May light guide your path, kindness fill your heart, and abundance bless your home. Over the past two weeks we have been enjoying learning about Diwali and taking part in related experiences. Thank you to the staff, parents and whanau who have helped make this possible.

Recently we were privileged to host Catherine Gallagher, Clinical Psychologist, to speak to both staff and parents around Understanding and Managing Children's Anxiety.

Some key messages from Catherine:

- Feeling some anxiety is a normal and necessary part of life that we need to support tamariki to be ok with feeling.
- It's important to understand it and know how to handle anxiety and not let it get in the way of living life
- Anxiety can look like a range of behaviors such as stubbornness, tears, clinginess, angry, withdrawing and it's useful to help tamariki to identify when their worry brain is kicking off
- Tamariki take their lead from us they do what they see and feel what others feel
- Avoiding something that causes anxiety is natural but it's not helpful in the long term, we get less anxious about something by experiencing that thing. Support your child to be brave - this stretching them out of their comfort zone.
- We need to be the calm and not join their 'storm', this often means we as adults need to regulate ourselves first.
- Help tamariki to identify what's within their influence, focusing on what we can't control can feed our anxiety and that feeling of 'what if..'

Thank you to those parents who came along to our evening with Catherine, we hope you felt empowered and left feeling more confident in supporting your child when anxiety shows up.

# Curriculum Update

As you are aware from these newsletter updates, this year new maths (Year 0-8) and English (Year 0-6) curricula were mandated for use this year. Our teachers and leaders have spent many, many hours undertaking professional development to unpack them and become familiar what they need to teach at each year level. It has required new systems and reporting frameworks, and new assessment tools. On Sunday 19th, unexpectedly, new maths and English curricula (for Year 0-10) for use from the start of 2026 were published on the Ministry of Education website. While there had been rumours and indications that some 'tweaks' would be made, we were in no way prepared for the changes that have taken place without notice or consultation.

The framework of 'Understand, Know, Do' that the draft refreshed curriculum AND the 2025 maths and English curricula were based on has been removed and the content is now arranged under Knowledge and Practices.

The content of what is to be taught at each year has also been changed considerably, particularly in the maths curriculum. Educators, professional development providers and educational experts are all now scrambling to unpack this latest curriculum and develop an understanding of exactly what and how things have changed. The information I've received so far indicates content to be taught has been moved further down, for example some maths concepts that were previously Year 9 objectives are now being introduced in Year 6. There are also considerably more objectives to be taught at each year level in maths. This will mean that student achievement data from this year will have limited ability to be compared to data from next year, and that children who are meeting this year's expectations may not be meeting expectations under the 2026 curriculum.

We know it has been as frustrating for you, as it has been for us, as teachers teach a curriculum this year at the same time they are learning it and therefore haven't been able to answer some of your questions. We will continue to use our BSLA (structured literacy) teaching approaches and we know the BSLA team will be revisiting and making required changes. We will continue to work with professional learning facilitators both those provided by the Ministry of Education as well as those we contract as a school. Much of the work we have done this year will need to be redone and we appreciate your understanding.

As a team of experienced and dedicated teachers and leaders, we will also continue to advocate for research informed teaching and learning practice and what we know is important for children's learning and development.


